### 10 Statistics About the Working Poor That Will Blow Your Mind\*

The following are 10 statistics about the working poor in America that will blow your mind...

**#1** According to the U.S. Census Bureau, <u>more than</u> <u>146 million Americans</u> are either "poor" or "low income".

#2 The U.S. economy continues to trade good paying jobs for low paying jobs. 60 percent of the jobs lost during the last recession were mid-wage jobs, but 58 percent of the jobs created since then have been low wage jobs.

**#3** Back in 1980, less than <u>30%</u> of all jobs in the United States were low income jobs. Today, <u>more</u> than 40% of all jobs in the United States are low income jobs.

#4 Low income families spend about <u>8.6 percent</u> of their incomes on gasoline. Other families spend about <u>2.1 percent</u>.

**#5** According to one survey, <u>77</u> <u>percent</u> of all Americans are now living paycheck to paycheck at least part of the time.

#6 In 1989, the debt to income ratio of the average American family was about <u>58 per-</u> <u>cent</u>. Today it is up to <u>154</u> <u>percent</u>.

**#7** According to Forbes, the 400 wealthiest Americans have more wealth than the bottom 150 million Americans <u>com-</u> <u>bined</u> **#8** The six heirs of Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton have a net worth that is roughly equal to the **bottom 30 percent** of all Americans combined.

**#9** The number of Americans on food stamps has grown from <u>17 million</u> in the year 2000 to more than <u>47 million</u> today.

**#10** If you can believe it, the federal government hands out money to <u>128 million Americans</u> every single month.
