# American Red Cross

## **Our "Everyday Heroes" Fannin County**

Some of the American Red Cross "everyday heroes" gather once a month, on a Monday, at their office located within the Fannin County Fire Department., in downtown Blue Ridge, to discuss ways to better serve the community. Meet the Fannin County DAT, Nick Wimberley, Captain; and Richard Crosley and Fred Cory, Co-Captains. Nick Wimberley has been active in the American Red Cross for 25 + years, and with the Boy Scouts of America for 40 + years. He is currently employed by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census as a Field Representative.

In addition, Fred Cory has been a volunteer for the Red Cross for three years. He currently serves as Deputy Operations Chief of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), and Emergency Medical Care First Responder, Fannin County Fire Department. Cory stated, "We have close ties and strong relationships with Fannin County EMA and the Fire Department."

Fannin DAT is diverse, well trained, and actively involved in the community. There are 25 members on the team, including two medical responders, a firefighter, a grief counselor, and two ham radio operators. Wimberley

stated that they are usually the "persons you sometimes see arriving in the middle of the night to provide shelter, clothing, and food for victims of family fires." Fannin DAT is a strong group of volunteers who perform disaster services when called upon.

According to Mr. Wimberley, Fannin DAT has many stories to tell. For example, the United States Navy issued a Citation to Fannin DAT for services rendered during a Navy plane crash in April, 2010. Both Wimberley and Cory agree that the "best story is in the eyes of a family as they stand in the early morning hours watching their homes being destroyed by fire when Fannin DAT members arrive with a promise of a warm, safe place to sleep, fresh clothing, comfort kits, and provisions for food for a few days."

Our "Everyday Heroes," the Fannin County DAT of Blue Ridge, Georgia, respond to fires, disasters, and calls for help throughout Fannin County, Gilmer and Pickens Counties, Georgia, and Polk County, Tennessee, any time, day or night. Thank you, Heroes!

## **Disaster Preparation Seminar Gets Positive Results**

The small plane crash in 2010, near the church; and the snow/ice storm of 2011, prompted the residents of Nature's Peace, in Forsyth County to be prepared for the next emergency.

On November 17, 2012, Reverend John Martin from the Deer Creek Shores Church hosted a Disaster Preparation Seminar, given by Larry Tyson, Red Cross Emergency Services Program Manager, and Forsyth County Emergency Service Management.

Mr. Tyson said, "Homeowners in our area should be able to "shelter in place" for a minimum of 72 hours (3-days). Prepare a 3-day Emergency Supply Kit to sustain until help arrives.

The results of the meeting were positive. Reverend John Martin from Deer Creek Shores Church announced plans for the church to become a 50-bed Red Cross Emergency Shelter when needed. In addition, the church will recruit and train potential volunteers who will act as emergency shelter staff.
