Georgia Red Cross Transitions to Client Casework

Help Still Available for Families with Tornado-Caused Needs

As the demand for Red Cross sheltering and feeding has dwindled, a sign that tornado-affected Georgians are moving forward with their recovery, the Red Cross is now transitioning to client casework.

Volunteer caseworkers continue to go door-to-door, county-by-county in identified, hard-hit areas to offer Red Cross resources to survivors. When families aren't home, caseworkers leave a note with follow-up information and resulting call-backs to the toll-free Red Cross Georgia Tornado Call Center grow daily.

"We'll continue to work with families on a case-by-case basis to evaluate their emergency caused needs and to make referrals to government and community resources that can also help, said Fran O'Shaughnessy, Director of the Georgia Red Cross Tornado relief operation. "Our ultimate goal is to ensure that all Red Cross clients displaced by the tornadoes have a working recovery plan."

Well before the tornadoes hit on April 27, Red Cross volunteers prepared to respond. Local Disaster Action Teams were among the first to shelter, feed, and comfort their devastated neighbors in the aftermath of the storms.

Red Cross Response to Date:

- 418 Red Cross volunteers and staff in hard-hit areas of Georgia are working with community partners to help families meet their tornado-caused needs.
- **49,703** meals have been served and **1,641** clean-up and comfort kits have been distributed. 10 Emergency response vehicles were mobilized to provide mobile feeding and clean-up supply distribution.
- **10,754 bulk items have been distributed** (including rakes, sunscreen, diapers, baby formula, insect repellent, garbage bags, dust masks, paper towels, and more).
- 486 people were provided safe haven in 11 Red Cross shelters. As people made their way home or found











- alternative housing, Red Cross shelters were closed. The Red Cross is working with local emergency partners to ensure any temporary emergency housing needs are met.
- Red Cross nurses and mental health counselors are providing health and mental health services for those facing the daunting task of rebuilding.
- Red Cross damage assessment teams reported 600 homes in Georgia destroyed, 595 with major damage.

Georgia Red Cross Working with Partners to Help Neighbors in Need

Here is a sampling of Red Cross tornado relief partnerships:

- **UPS** helped with logistics; picking up donated supplies and delivering them to distribution sites across the state.
- **The Home Depot** provided various clean-up supplies (tarps, buckets, gloves, bleach, etc.) for bulk distribution.
- **Shaw Industries** in Dalton donated use of a centrally located air-conditioned warehouse that served as a distribution center for Red Cross relief supplies.
- **The Southern Baptists** prepared thousands of meals that were picked up by Red Cross emergency response vehicles and distributed to tornado survivors in northwest Georgia.
- The American Legion and the Trinity United Methodist Church (UMC) in Trenton prepared meals for tornado victims in their community.
- **Tractor Supply Company** donated a tractor trailer load of water for distribution, as provided additional in-kind support.
- **Financial Partners,** whose generous support is turned into meals, blankets, shelters, clothing, emotional support and much more to help those in need.

25 Georgia Counties Designated for Federal Assistance Recovery Centers Open in Multiple Locations

Twenty five counties were designated for disaster assistance as part of Georgia's federal disaster declaration: Bartow, Catoosa, Cherokee, Coweta, Dade, Floyd, Gordon, Greene, Habersham, Harris,

Heard, Lamar, Lumpkin, Meriwether, Monroe, Morgan, Newton, Pickens, Polk, Rabun, Spalding, Troup, Upson, White and Walker.

Affected individuals and business owners in these counties can apply for assistance by calling FEMA's toll-free number, **800-621-FEMA** (**3362**). An online application can be completed at www.DisasterAssistance.gov. Individual assistance for homeowners and renters can include grants to help pay for rental housing, home repairs, and serious disaster-related expenses not met by insurance or other assistance programs.

Disaster Recovery Centers are open in Bartow, Catoosa, Dade, Floyd, Lamar, Meriwether, Morgan, Pickens, Rabun, Spalding, Troup, and Walker counties. They remain open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily until further notice. Visit www.fema.gov for locations.
