August Heat

Does Reading Aloud Really Matter? Yes!

More than one in three children arrive at kindergarten without the skills necessary for lifetime learning. Research shows that reading aloud is the single most important thing you can do to help a child prepare for reading and learning. Reading aloud builds literacy skills.

Mama Is A Pilot

Author: Barbara/Raina Meyers; Illustrator: Bonnie McCarthy OurRainbow Press

Repeat the Book: Repeating gives more chances to learn the vocabulary.

First Read (events) - Look at the cover, read the title and say, "*I wonder why the child is hugging Mama so tightly? Let's read and find out.*" Stop and talk about Mama being a pilot and how exciting that must be. If any activities that you and your child do together are shown in the story, stop and talk about similarities. Ask the <u>first read</u> question in the <u>Ask Questions</u> section.

Second Read (emotions) - Before reading, say, "*I wonder how the child and Mama feel about having to be away from each other so much? Let's read and find out.*" Talk about how they might feel when Mama comes home and when Mama has to get ready to leave again. Talk about different emotions you think they experience, such as happiness, sadness, confusion, and even anger. Ask the <u>second read</u> question.

Third Read (retell) - Before reading, say, "*Now that you know this story, it is your turn to retell the story to me.*" As you and your child hold the book, have your child point to tell you what is happening in the story. Ask the <u>third read</u> question.



Vocabulary Use these words when you talk with your child this month

special - very important or loved

glow - to shine with low light

festival - a special event when people gather to celebrate something

cuddle - to hold and hug

bunk - a small bed

Engage and Enjoy: Using these activities keeps your child's interest in the story.

As you read, use words such as *"Wow"* and *"Fantastic"* when you read about the things Mama does as a pilot and the things she brings home for her child. When Mama comes home, use an *excited voice* as they hug and tickle each other.

Ask Questions: After talking about the book, ask questions to promote deeper thinking.

After the <u>first read</u>, ask your child, "Why does Mama have to leave?" After the <u>second read</u>, ask, "Which page shows the child being upset because Mama has left?" After the <u>third read</u>, ask, "What makes you think the child might want to be a pilot like Mama?"

Do More: Use other activities to help your child connect vocabulary to their world outside of the story.
